Porirua City Council and Rotary Leadership Awards:

Literacy & Maths:

There have been a few recent education announcements that have caused concern for schools, their principals and teachers. Two weeks ago, it was announced that the new mathematics curriculum roll out will be expected to be in place at the start of Term One, 2025, alongside the refreshed English curriculum. As you will know, Pāuatahanui School has been changing the way we teach literacy over the past 2 to 3 years. These changes have taken time to get our heads around as they have meant some significant shifts

in the way we teach. Our team of awesome teachers have made these changes but it hasn't been easy. Sustainable change is an evolution, not a revolution.

The changes proposed by the government have been fast tracked due to assessment data stating that only 22% of Year 8 students are achieving at curriculum expectations. This was a dishonest use of data as it was based on testing of a small sample of less than 900 students against new draft curriculum expectations that haven't even been taught yet. Though there is a need for schools to improve the teaching of literacy and maths to ensure equitable outcomes for students, getting schools to make two significant pedagogical shifts in a short space of time, without suitable professional development, is asking too much of schools and their teams.

At Pāuatahanui School, we are, thankfully, in a position where these changes will not greatly affect us. We are already implementing structured approaches to literacy and we have been engaged in professional development around Maths pedagogy. We are seeing the positive effects on student outcomes and the growth in professional knowledge of our teachers. We will not be rushing to make any changes in the near future.

We acknowledge that success looks different for each individual child. As well as academic areas such as literacy and maths, we also value the arts, physical activity, and learning about the world around us. We know that students can be amazing artists, sports people and kind, caring citizens. This is also success for our ākonga. We do want to ensure our students have strong literacy and maths foundations, we also want to expose the richness of these other areas of the curriculum.

Visit from Gillian Candler:



Thank you for hosting me.


Ō Maātou Uara/ Values:

It was always our intention to have images for our new school values properly designed. Fortunately I happen to have a very talented cousin Kohe Webster who is an artist and who has Ngati Toa and Nagti Raukawa whakpapa. Kohe works within the Wellington City Council's Mataaho Aronui team by day, and then turns into an illustrator by night. He designed the latest, and last, cover of Our Wellington – Tō Tātou Pōneke.



Mahuta, and Tangaroa (below).

Kohe has provided us with some pretty amazing values designs and some really cool korero that explains the designs. We are very thankful to Kohe for gifting these amazing designs to us. The next step is to have them more visible around our school.



Pūkengatanga - This design uses pākati (spearhead-shape) as the main element. Pākati is a whakairo pattern that is generally used to depict strength and can also be used to depict leadership. It's framed by a sort of rauponga design, which generally can be used to represent whakapapa - what came before made it possible to excel. It propels you forward in grounding you in your identity.

Mana Autūroa - This one was inspired by the use of the compass we originally had. Stars have been used to essentially represent the same idea. The whetū were obviously a key navigation tool for Māori so the concept aligns well. It lends itself to aspirations as well - a sort of pae tawhiti or far off land that feeds our curiosity to explore.

Kotahitanga - This uses a pūhoro design, which is used in kowhaiwhai and moko. The pattern here is used to represent two things, the interlinking of the design shows unity but also is often used to depict water. Wai is the essence of life and connects us all as people.

Manaakitanga - This uses a kaokao design overlayed on a poutama design. Both are elements that come from weaved Tukutuku panels. Kaokao is the triangular shape at the fore. Kaokao sort of means 'armpit' but is used to represent protection the responsibility we have to one another, which works in with the manaaki concept. The stepped pattern behind is poutama. This is often used in education as it comes from the story of Tāne ascending the heavens and acquiring the Kete of knowledge.


Yummy Stickers




